Geology tells a different story.

As the last ice age ended, the final glaciers, covering what are now the northern reaches of the United States, receded. The incredible grinding pressures of this action gouged enormous holes in what is now the Finger Lakes region. These became not only our eleven famous lakes, but also the magnificent geologic anomalies throughout the region that include incredible gorges and over 1,000 waterfalls. The lakes range from 3 to 40 miles in length and from 30 to an amazing 632 feet in depth.







If you have a day . . .

Hike the 1-1/2 mile Gorge Trail at Watkins Glen State Park—walk behind, over and next to 19 waterfalls and cascades that splash down a grotto-like gorge. Add a visit to Skyland Farm Art Gallery and Café or the Farm Sanctuary (p.100) and you'll have a day to remember!

Planning a long weekend?

Tour the "National Historic Landmark" village of Geneseo and visit the 1941 Historic Aircraft Group Museum.

- Explore natural wonders at Letchworth State Park, known as the "Grand Canyon of the East" and celebrating its Centennial in 2006-2007. While visiting the park, stop by the Mt. Morris Dam the largest dam of its type east of the Mississippi River!
 - The American Red Cross is celebrating its 125th anniversary in 2006. Take a selfguided tour of the Clara Barton Chapter #1 Home, the first chapter of the American Red Cross located in Dansville.
 - Visit the Dogwood Trading Company for a truly unique shopping experience (p.115).

A longer vacation might include . . .

- Exploring Finger Lakes National Forest (p.6), with its trails for hiking, horseback riding, crosscountry skiing and snowmobiling, as well as hunting and fishing.
- Tasting a variety of Finger Lakes wines at several of the wineries located between Seneca and Cayuga lakes (p.21). Enjoy lunch or dinner overlooking the water at a winery café or restaurant.
- Stopping at Taughannock Falls State Park on the way back to Ithaca to view a 215-foot waterfall plunging through a rock amphitheater whose walls are nearly 400 feet high.
- Exploring Ithaca's Discovery Trail, shopping on the Ithaca Commons' pedestrian mall, and driving through the Cornell University and Ithaca College campuses. Complete your Finger Lakes vacation by cruising the clear waters of Cayuga Lake aboard Alcyone Charter's 35.5 foot sloop (p.100).

Bring the entire family for summer camping fun. Canoe or kayak the rivers, streams or lakes as the sun reflects off the early morning mist. Cruise the lakes while you enjoy vistas of vineyards, farmlands, cottages

and homes along the shores.

Glorious red, yellow, gold, orange and copper foliage will spice up your fall tour. Marvel at "monster" machines as they harvest the fruits of the farmers' labors. Sample Finger Lakes wines. Shop farm markets and roadside stands for a variety of fall produce or, for a hands-on farm experience, visit some of the u-pick farms where you can harvest your own fruits and vegetables. This is a perfect time to take a fall foliage train ride aboard Tioga Scenic Railroad in Owego.

State Parks

There are an abundance of state parks in the Finger Lakes under the jurisdiction of three separate regions. They are among the finest parks in the northeast and their facilities will accommodate hundreds of thousands.

The parks are generally open from early spring until late fall depending upon weather conditions. For specific information, write or phone the regional office. 2006 admission is \$7* per car for parks with swimming beaches and \$6* per car for parks without. Motorcoach admission is \$35* non-profit & \$75* commercial, with the exception of Watkins Glen which is \$50.* Old Erie Canal has no admission fee. *2006 rates at publication time - may be subject to change.





Navigate the Waterways

Dine as you navigate the waterways aboard the Canandaigua Lady (p.70), the Keuka Maid (p.114), the Esperanza Rose (p.114) or Captain Bill's Seneca Lake Cruises (p.100). Cruise options on the "Best 100 Miles" of the Erie Canal include Mid-Lakes Navigation, operating on the canal and Skaneateles Lake (p.84).

Take the entire family for a day of outdoor fun at Roseland Waterpark in Canandaigua or Seabreeze Amusement Park in Rochester.

Explore the Land

Hike, bike, downhill or cross-country ski, rock climb or snowmobile your way across the Finger Lakes region. For a more relaxed vacation, watch flocks of waterfowl as they pursue their annual spring and fall migrations, or seek out a rare species at a wildlife sanctuary such as Montezuma Wildlife Refuge near Seneca Falls. Hike the trails and study the wildlife at the Tanglewood Nature Center & Museum in Elmira (p.101).

Trail network, which connects the Catskill
Mountains with the
Allegheny Mountains.

The multi-use Keuka Outlet Trail follows the outlet from Keuka Lake to Seneca Lake along the 6-mile path of an old railroad bed. The beautiful Catharine Valley Trail can be accessed in the Montour Falls area off State Rt. 14. Hike,

cross-country ski, snowshoe or snowmobile on 823 acres at Fair Haven Beach State Park on Lake Ontario. Trails along the New York State canal system are also multi-use, following the path of the canal through both rural and urban settings.

Genesee Valley Greenway

Genesee Valley Greenway is a 90-mile multi-use trail following the historic route of the Genesee Valley Canal (1840-1878) and Pennsylvania Railroad (1882-1963) from the Erie Canalway Trail in Rochester to Hinsdale in Cattaraugus County. 52 miles of trail are open for hiking, biking, horseback riding, cross-country skiing and snowshoeing. Snowmobiling is also allowed in designated areas. For more information, call 585-624-2569 or visit www.fogvg.org.



Planning a long weekend?

- Visiting the Erie Canal Museum in Syracuse, the only remaining weighlock building, where you can discover what life was like along the Erie Canal in its early years. Then make your way along the canal as it wends its way across the region from Syracuse to Rochester. You'll discover today's canal is geared toward recreation rather than the transportation of goods. You have a choice here — you can rent a canalboat and cruise the canal and pass through the locks, stopping to visit the attractions along the shores, or...
 - Hike or bike your way along the paths that follow the waterway. You will find canal parks, attractions and beautiful scenery. Several canal cruises are available along the way to give you a change of pace.





Each lake is unique and named with a Native American word. They are listed from west to east:

Ontario "Beautiful Lake" Area 20,518,400 acres Length 193 miles Max.

Depth 802 feet Width 53 miles Volume 393 cubic miles Elevation 243 feet Largest U.S. city Rochester Characteristics Lake Ontario is the smallest and eastern-most of the Great Lakes with a drainage basin covering parts of Ontario, Canada and New York. The lake is used for transportation of goods, recreation and fishing. Canadian cities bordering Lake Ontario include Hamilton and Toronto.

Conesus "Always Beautiful" Area 3,420 acres Length 8 miles Shoreline 18.5 miles Max. Depth 66 feet Max. Width 1 mile Volume 42.6 billion gallons Elevation 818 feet Largest town Lakeville Characteristics Small, quiet and pretty. It is a source of drinking water for nearby towns and villages.

Hemlock The only lake the white man named which refers to the native American word "Ohnehda" Area 1,800 acres Length 7 miles Shoreline 17.1 miles Max. Depth 91 feet Max. Width 0.5 mile Volume 28.7 billion gallons Elevation 905 feet Largest town Hemlock Characteristics Outboard motors are limited to under ten horsepower and access is allowed by permit only. It is one of the sources of water for the City of Rochester.

Canadice "Long Lake" Area 649 acres Length 3 miles Shoreline 7.2 miles Max. Depth 95 feet Max. Width 0.3 mile Volume 11.6 billion gallons Elevation 1096 feet Largest town Canadice Characteristics The highest in elevation, yet the smallest of the Finger Lakes. Boats may not exceed 16 feet in length and motors may not exceed 10 horsepower. Access to the lake is by permit only. It is one of the sources of water for the City of Rochester.

Honeoye "Finger Lying" Area 1,772 acres Length 4.5 miles Shoreline 10.8 miles Max. Depth 30 feet Max. Width 0.8 mile Volume 9.5 billion gallons Elevation 804 feet Largest town Honeoye Characteristics Small and the shallowest of the Finger Lakes. Its principle use is for water-based recreation.

Canandaigua "Chosen Spot" or "Chosen Place" Area 10,558 acres Length 15.5 miles Shoreline 36 miles Max. Depth 276 feet Max. Width 1.5 mile Volume 445.5 billion gallons Elevation 688 feet Largest city Canandaigua Characteristics Mostly lined by homes, Canandaigua Lake serves as a public water supply for Canandaigua, Newark, Palmyra, Rushville and the township of Gorham.

Keuka "Canoe Landing" Area 11,584 acres Length 19.6 miles Shoreline 59 miles Max. Depth 183 feet Max. Width 1.9 miles Volume 390 billion gallons Elevation 715 feet Largest town Penn Yan Characteristics Y shape with a bluff 800 feet above lake level. The only Finger Lake with an outlet into another Finger Lake (Seneca). The lake serves as a public water supply for Hammondsport, Branchport, Penn Yan and Keuka College.

Seneca "Place of the Stone" or "Stoney Place" Area 43,343 acres Length 38 miles Shoreline 75.4 miles Max. Depth 618 feet Max. Width 3 miles Volume 4.2 trillion gallons Elevation 445 feet Largest city Geneva Characteristics The deepest and widest of the Finger Lakes and the second deepest lake in New York State. Has more wineries than any other Finger Lake and has frozen over only 9 times since the beginning of weather recordkeeping.

Cayuga "Boat Landing" Area 42,956 acres Length 40 miles Shoreline 96 miles Max. Depth 435 feet Max. Width 3.5 miles Volume 2.5 trillion gallons Elevation 382 feet Largest city Ithaca Characteristics Longest of the Finger Lakes and the lowest to sea level. This lake accesses the Erie Canal through the Cayuga-Seneca Canal which joins the northern ends of Seneca and Cayuga Lakes.

OWASCO "Floating Bridge" or "Crossing Place" Area 6,665 acres Length 11 miles Shoreline 23 miles Max. Depth 177 feet Max. Width 1 mile Volume 212 billion gallons Elevation 711 feet Largest city Auburn Characteristics Laid back and a good trout fishing lake.

Skaneateles "Long Lake" Area 8,960 acres Length 15 miles
Shoreline 31 miles Max. Depth 315 feet Max. Width 1 mile Volume 424.5
billion gallons Elevation 863 feet Largest town Skaneateles Characteristics
Cold, clean water with shale base. Has steep hillsides at southern end and is the third deepest Finger Lake.

Experience shopping at roadside farm stands such as Joseph's Wayside Market (pg.114) in Naples or Red Jacket Orchards (p.70) in Geneva, or at one of the region's craft festivals, as well as hunting for antiques and discovering one-of-a-kind artisan creations. The area is home to many small town "Main Streets," major shopping malls and outlet stores. See Shopping from A to Z, page 36.

Join us in celebrating potatoes, tomatoes,

strawberries, apples, sauerkraut, maple syrup, grapes and wine — each merits its own festival! For dates and locations, see



Savor the fresh produce and home-baked goods! Pick your own apples, grapes, asparagus, tomatoes, pumpkins and strawberries, or purchase them fresh-picked from a roadside stand. A grape pie from Naples is always a popular treat.

Shop at some of the Farm and Craft markets that dot the Finger Lakes landscape. You can find fresh fruits and vegetables, baked goods, local crafts and much more at these outdoor/indoor markets. Spend a Saturday browsing over 200 shops at the largest — the Windmill Farm and Craft Market (p.117) — located between Keuka and Seneca Lakes. Ithaca Farmers' Market at Steamboat Landing (p.100) is a great opportunity to shop for local products, meet Finger Lakes vendors and mix with local shoppers. You'll also find that many communities have a Saturday farmers' market in a downtown parking lot or along downtown sidewalks.

As you drive the rural roads of the Finger Lakes, keep an eye out for Amish or Mennonite families riding bicycles or in horse-drawn wagons and carriages. Watch them work their fields with horse-drawn equipment or steel-wheeled tractors. Notice the unique contrast between their horse-drawn equipment and their neighbor's huge mechanical harvesters. Visit their shops and experience the strong cultural heritage these families bring to their communities.







Are you looking for concerts, plays, galleries or festivals? You'll find them in small towns or large cities, in summer theatres, concert halls, at university halls and churches, in town parks and state forests throughout the Finger Lakes. Plan to

take in a performance at "The MAC" Performing

Arts Center in Canandaigua, the site of popular outdoor concerts and entertainment, as well as the summer home of the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra.

Summer theatres offering a full schedule of matinee and evening productions include the Merry-Go-Round

Playhouse in Auburn (p.86) or Cortland Repertory Theatre near Cortland (p.104), Year-round entertainment venues include Rochester Broadway Theatre League (p.75), the Smith Opera House in Geneva (p.75), the Kitchen Theatre Company in Ithaca or the Clemens Center for the Performing Arts in Elmira (p.104). October-May, take in a performance at the Ti-Ahwaga Performing Arts Center in Owego (p.104).

Louis C. Tiffany designed Willard Memorial Chapel in Auburn and today it is one of few unaltered Tiffany chapels known to exist. Its majestic beauty will enrich your Finger Lakes experience.

Visit an English village during the time of Queen Elizabeth's reign at the Sterling Renaissance Festival. Live theatre, music and dance, magic, puppetry and authentic jousting will transport you to another era (p.84).

Pageantry, original music by the Mormon Tabernacle Choir, Hollywood special effects and a costumed cast of 650 are combined at the Hill Cumorah Pageant in July. The pageant depicts the SKANEATELES FESTIVAL

origin of the Mormon religion at the site where the church had its beginnings. Several historic sites in the area invite you to tour and learn more about

Mormon history (p.71).

If you prefer to spend your vacation in the great outdoors, plan to attend one of the Arts and Crafts Festivals held in communities throughout the Finger Lakes. 

Visit community history museums to learn about inventors and manufacturers along with men and women who contributed to our heritage. Glimpse life as it was lived during the past two centuries at the Seneca Falls Historical Society Museum (p.84), Geneva Historical Society's Prouty-Chew Museum (p.71), Genesee Country Village & Museum in Mumford (p.71) and the Yates County Genealogical Society's Oliver House in Penn Yan (p.114). The most famous literary landmark in America, the Mark Twain Study, where the author wrote Adventures of Huckleberry Finn and other classics, is located on the picturesque campus of Elmira College.

If you have a day . . .

Participants in full regalia hold mock battles, sleep in tents and cook over open campfires



Native Americans

The Iroquois Confederation was centered in the Finger Lakes and included the Senecas, Onondagas, Mohawks, Cayugas and Oneidas, who banded together for mutual defense. In 1722, the Tuscaroras joined them as the sixth nation. Learn about the history and culture of these original inhabitants of the Finger Lakes at the Ganondagan State Historic Site near Victor, and the Rochester Museum and Science Center in Rochester (p.72) in addition to the Seneca Council House and the grave of Mary Jemison at Letchworth State Park.

Underground Railroad

fleeing from the southern states to the northern "free states" and Canada. Visit the Auburn home of Harriet Tubman (p.84), a former slave herself, who personally conducted over 300 people to freedom, earning her the title "Moses of Her People." Make a second connection with the Underground Railroad at the Seward House, also in Auburn (p.84). The Onondaga Historical Association in Syracuse, offers an interactive exhibit where you can learn about the history of antislavery and Underground Railroad activity. Continue on to Rochester to visit several Frederick Douglass sites, including his grave in Mt. Hope Cemetery. Douglass is believed to be the first African-American in the U.S. to be honored with a statue.



Several magnificent Finger Lakes mansions combine with splendid gardens to provide a pathway to the past. William H. Seward's home (p.84) in Auburn displays the lifetime collections and gardens of the former New York Governor, U.S. Senator and Secretary of State under Presidents Lincoln and Johnson and prime mover in the purchase of Alaska. In addition to the mansion at Sonnenberg Gardens & Mansion State Historic Park (p.72) in Canandaigua, the extensive grounds feature nine spectacular themed gardens, an

For the aviation enthusiast . . .

Your trip begins in Elmira where you'll learn the history of the glider at the National Soaring Museum (p.101), then take to the sky at Harris Hill Gliderport (p.100) right next door. Take a trip through time at the Wings of Eagles Discovery Center (p.101), tracing aviation from the early pioneers, through the Golden Age of Flight, to the frontiers of space travel. Then you're off to Hammondsport to learn about early Curtiss airplanes, engines and innovations at the Glenn H. Curtiss Museum (p.114). A visit to Geneseo's 1941 Historic Aircraft Group Museum will give you insight to the restoration of WWII planes.

Canals

Follow the history trail of transportation in the Finger Lakes from the building of the Erie Canal with its mule-drawn barges to a ride on The Cat (p.70), fast ferry, traveling between Rochester and Toronto, Canada. As the highway system developed, so did the modes of transportation — from horse-drawn wagons and carriages to sleek automobiles, from bicycles to motorcycles, from primitive aircraft to the super jets of today. The trail you will travel will lead you to the Canal Museum, and several museums featuring horseless carriages as well as vintage and modern aircraft.

Women's Rights

Walk in the footsteps of Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Lucretia Mott, Mary Ann and Thomas M'Clintock, Susan B. Anthony and Frederick Douglass through the struggle for women's rights — right here in the Finger Lakes. The story is chronicled at the Women's Rights National Historical Park in Seneca Falls, including the Wesleyan Chapel where the first Women's Rights Convention was held in 1848. Additional sites in the women's rights movement include the Elizabeth Cady Stanton House in Seneca Falls and the Susan B. Anthony House in

Invention cinnovation industry

Spend a couple of hours at the home of one of the best known figures in the Finger Lakes, George Eastman. This estate in the heart of Rochester's cultural district combines the treasures of the world's leading museum of photography and film with the stately pleasures of Eastman's Landmark Colonial Revival home (p.71).

The 1890 House Museum and Center for Victorian Arts in Cortland was built by Chester Wickwire, a manufacturer of window screening, fencing and other wire products. J. B. Tiffany consulted on the interior. The house is listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

Also in Cortland, the Suggett House Museum is the 1882 Italianate home of inventor and real estate developer James Suggett. The house features "At Home: Cortland County Interior Spaces, 1825-1900," vignettes exhibiting the basic elements of style of the area in the 19th century.

One of America's finest examples of Greek Revival architecture, Rose Hill Mansion, built by and named for Robert Sheldon Rose, housed a succession of prominent families. In 1850, the farm passed to Robert Swan who installed a tile drainage system which was, in part, responsible for earning Rose Hill a well-deserved niche in the annals of Agricultural History (p.72).



Postmasters, Presidents Political Speechmakers

Visit sites that commemorate the lives of Finger Lakes natives who played major political roles as our nation developed.

Millard Fillmore, 13th President of the United States, was born near Moravia. You can find a replica of the log cabin where he was born at Fillmore Glen State Park (p.6).

Gideon Granger, Postmaster General under Presidents Jefferson and Madison, built his stately Federal-style home in Canandaigua. Tour the mansion and the Carriage Museum (p.71).

Robert Green Ingersoll was the best-known orator and political speechmaker of the 19th century. His home in Dresden, on the west shore of Seneca Lake, is filled with fascinating memorabilia about the history of dissent in America (p.114).

William H. Seward served as Governor of New York, U.S. Senator and Secretary of State to Presidents Lincoln and Johnson. His home in Auburn will give you a glimpse of his fascinating life (p.84).
